

## New year roaming - it's Free

Good heavens its 2009, doesn't time fly when you're having fun, well I hope you've been having fun. 2008 came and went; we hardly noticed. We did find out how cheap travel can be, with Advance train tickets now being sold all over the Country without you having to go through an interrogation. You can go to London for just £3.00 each way, the £10 DaySave tickets which let you travel anywhere on the Southern train network, National Express East Coast the major train booking web site etc.

But I can now reveal an even bigger secret and I apologise for this particular piece of news being only of interest to our more mature readers. If you are fortunate enough to be over sixty, which as we all know is the new forty, and have got yourself a National bus pass then you can use National Express coaches FREE. Yes you can and have been able to do so since last April but no one told us. From Brighton's Pool Valley\* you can take the number 25, the London service, just show your pass and off you go. Of course you can hop off at Gatwick which is good news but you can't go to any other airport, Heathrow for example. So for us down here we can only get the number 25 which goes all the way to Victoria. You can also get 'almost' to Portsmouth, quite where almost is I'm not sure. I tried this out recently and discovered that if you are travelling down to Brighton from Gatwick then you can catch any coach, it is all unnecessarily complicated.

The reason is, when the Government introduced the National Bus Pass last April the legislation included all routes that are designated as bus routes. There are probably hundreds of bus routes across the Country that are also covered by National Express coaches. But they are not published, National Express say that it's all very complicated and a "grey area". You have to call them in advance to ask if the particular journey that you want to take is

a designated bus route and is available for free travel, the number is 0844 844 2304.

Of course they hedge this with all sorts of offputting rules; in essence you can travel free so long as there are seats available. If the coach is fully booked with paying customers you're out of luck, this runs contrary to the spirit, if not the letter of the law.

Naturally they don't want to take you for free, although the Government and local authorities reimburse them, it takes time and some effort for them, one's heart bleeds.

But they are about to dig it all up again, of course how silly of us to think that six months of disruption would have been enough. It seems that they forgot to put a new gas pipe in, or maybe its water, whatever, it's all coming up again. Then National Express will build a ticket office now that will be

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novel, a bus station where you can actually buy a ticket.
