Well what a difference a few weeks can make as we understand that this fine venue has been revamped, rethought, repainted and, hopefully, reopened in early April. The organisers will say that this is the most exciting and innovative festival ever, the PR team has gone into overdrive. Festivals have their own audiences and this year's is selling extremely well, so maybe I am missing something. There are several intriguing events but it is all very worthy but I am sorry to say that, in my humble opinion, the Brighton Festival is no longer for the ordinary folk of Brighton. But was it ever?
