News from the Coach House

"Evergreens in winter thyme evergreens in every time."

The term evergreen means a plant that has its leaves throughout the year-metaphorically continuously renewing or self-renewing. Evergreens provide an important shelter for our wildlife friends in the winter months with their high tannin property making them unpalatable from predators. Traditionally it is therefore of no wonder that these plants were thought to be powerful and protective.

HOLLY - Ilex aquifolium also known as the Holy tree & Christ's thorn. Once thought to have magical powers over horses - hence whips being made from the wood. The tree was thought to protect one from lightening and therefore beneficial to grow one near your home. In Suffolk there is a holly tree reported to be seven feet wide in girth!

IVY - hedera helix also know as love stone. Traditionally herbalists believed ivy berries were good for curing a hangover which is perhaps why I have so much growing outside my door! Goblets were made form the wood in hope of curing bad wine. In medieval times ivy poles marked local taverns and a law had to be passed that the pole should be no more than seven feet tall as to control the competitive tavern owner! When food stocks run dry in cold winters months ivy berries provide an important food source for our birds. The flowers are one of the bee's last and final forages before they home down for the winter months.

YEW - Taxus baccata, Taxus baccata, is an ancient tree species that has survived since before the Ice Age. Traditionally it was associated with immortality, renewal, regeneration, everlasting life, rebirth, transformation and access to the 'Other World' and our ancestors. Hence often found growing in graveyards! We have a wonderful Yew Tree Forest in Kingley Vale near Chichester with trees up to 2000 year old - a days out and forever never forgotten.

BAY - Laurus Traditionally bay leaves and laurel berries were valued as being astringent, stimulant, and stomachic. The leaves and fruit made into a powder were applied to stings and bites According to legend the Delphi oracle chewed bay leaves, or sniffed the smoke of burning leaves to promote her visionary trances and in ancient Greece and Rome poets, emperors and heroes all used Bay leaves as a form of triumph. Hence the bacca-laureate means "laurel berries" which signifies the completion of a bachelor degree. Today we find Bay used in oils for rheumatism and homemade stews!
